I. Welcome

Godje Bialluch, Cluster Coordinator for East African Community Cooperation

"Integration is about people." This statement by the East African Community Secretary General Dr Peter Mutuku Mathuki, phrased before taking office in 2021, has been the paramount principle of EAC-Germany cooperation for a long time. Especially, in the current times of multiple crises and complex challenges, regional integration offers opportunities to strengthen economic and social resilience for the benefit of East Africans. Based on this fact, GIZ is working closely together with EAC to support regional integration in various sectors, aiming to bring tangible benefits to the mwananchi of East Africa.

On behalf of the German government, GIZ assists the EAC Secretariat and Partner States in driving the process of regional economic integration together with organisations from the private sector, civil society and academia. Utilising the potential of the African Continental Free Trade Area, diversification of industries and adding value to products and services in the region is at the forefront of this partnership. Furthermore, the cooperation extends to projects in the areas of pandemic preparedness and academic education with a focus on digital skills and innovation. In addition, global and regional projects funded by the German government to support border governance and e-commerce are jointly implemented with the EAC. GIZ is also implementing partner of the European Union in the EU-EAC MARKUP project.

The EAC and Germany are united by a long history of cooperation that predates the re-establishment of the Community in 2000. The German government has supported the East African integration since 1998, based on the common understanding that regional integration will improve the social and economic development of EAC Partner States. Since then, Germany has committed more that 580 million euros for development cooperation with the EAC, making Germany one of the biggest and most reliable bilateral development partners of the Community. In 2022, the EAC and Germany have reaffirmed their long-standing cooperation after agreeing on additional funding and implementation of new projects during official government negotiations. As GIZ, we have received new funds to engage with EAC on prominent issues of environment and natural resources – for now focusing specifically on integrated water resource management in the region – as well as to operationalise the cross-border movement of professionals based on a digital mechanism to accelerate trade in services.

Additionally, we are consulting with EAC on the possible support to integrating its newest Partner State, the Democratic Republic of the Congo, into the Community. As the EAC Secretary General rightfully pointed out, the inclusion of DRC holds vast potential as it will make the region more competitive economically due to a larger market, spanning from the Atlantic to the Indian Ocean. We are ready to support EAC in utilising this potential within the commission frameworks of our joint projects.

In this overview, we present to you a summary of projects jointly implemented with the EAC as well as short information on the teams developing partner-oriented, innovative and sustainable solutions for and with the EAC to achieve lasting results for the people of East Africa. You will also find some information on recent activities as well as success stories from our cooperation with EAC. II. Who We Are

Today, Germany supports the implementation of the Customs Union and the Common Market by working with the EAC Secretariat, national ministries and other stakeholders such as national and regional private sector and civil society associations and academic institutions. The core areas are sustainable economic development, training and employment and health, social protection and population policy of the EAC Partner States.

On behalf of the German government and other commissioning partners, GIZ implements projects in support of EAC integration in ten sectors.



Natacha Baranyuzwe – Good Manufacturing Practices Contributing to an Entrepreneurial Success Story



Natacha Baranyuzwe is a Rwandan entrepreneur believing in natural products to heal the world and be a source of livelihood for her community. After having been trained as a pharmacist, she set up her company BARANYUZWE COSMETICS Ltd in 2019 to produce herbal-based products for treatment of fungal infections of the scalp.

Already during her postgraduate studies, Natacha had discovered the therapeutic powers of Pidens Pilosa, a naturally occurring herbal plant in East Africa which has traditionally been used to treat various ailments. Due to intensive research, she was able to formulate a Bidens Pilosa hair shampoo and patented it at the Rwanda Development Board Intellectual Property Office. The product is a welcome relieve to women in Rwanda and beyond as the current alternatives are expensive and hardly effective.

After having set up her business, Natacha decided that she needed more expertise on how to produce high-quality products. Therefore, she partook in a six-week training on Good Manufacturing Practices (GMP) for herbal and traditional medicines offered by the EAC Secretariat via the GIZ SEAMPEC programme to entrepreneurs in all EAC Partner States in late 2020.

In 2022, over one year after the training, we wanted to hear from Natacha, how it has helped her business.

One thing is obvious – her product portfolio is growing. Already in 2020, Natacha had ventured into hand sanitizer production by blending ethanol and the Pidens Pilosa extract. The combination proved effective and has been licensed by both Rwanda Food and Drug Authority and the Rwanda Standards board. According to Natacha, the sanitizer has become so popular that it is now the brand of choice in most weddings and is being widely distributed in the country.

Natacha also used the training to improve the quality of her products even as she expanded her business. She stresses, "What I learned is that for high-quality products, you need highly qualified personal. Since the training, I hired two laboratory analysts and make sure that my staff is constantly trained." By now, Natacha is employing ten staff members.

Furthermore, Natasha notes, "Through the training, I realised that I cannot be competitive on the East African market with the rudimental instruments I had been using prior." Now, Natacha is using validated equipment to produce high-quality products. Additionally, she has established close working relations with the Rwanda Standards Board, so that she is always up to date on latest developments and can adjust accordingly.

Another aspect of the training was the importance of self-inspection. Since then, if there are any issues during production, Natacha identifies and solves them herself before the product goes on the market. "For each batch number, I have a quality control laboratory in place that checks the batch. The laboratory analyses basic parameters and guarantees high-quality products. If anything is missed, documentation allows to always link back to any specific batch."

All of this has benefited Natacha's business. Not only did she just start another new product line – solid soaps for different uses such as showering, hand washing, floor cleaning or laundry – she is also already thinking about developing her own line of drinking water.

Due to her high-quality products, Natacha has raised interest of exporters so that her products can be found in other EAC Partner States. Whilst for now, Natacha herself is only selling in Rwanda, expansion to the rest of EAC – including its newest member DRC – is already on the table.

What a great success story!

EAC Digital Pioneers – Easing Loan Requests for Burundian Bank Customers



Armel Bizoza had been working at BGF Bank in Bujumbura for some time as an IT Executive when he decided it was time for him to develop his skills even further. With a fully-funded scholarship via German Development Cooperation with the EAC, Armel started a Master's Programme in Embedded and Mobile Systems at CENIT@EA at the Nelson Mandela African Institution of Science and Technology (NM-AIST) in Arusha in January 2020.

When asked, why he changed from a paid job to university, Armel stressed that he felt the need to acquire additional knowledge. "I wanted to perform better as an IT expert. To grow your career, you must learn."

In fact, Armel was more than able to grow his career. At the end of his studies, he needed to find an internship place to apply the skills he had gained. For him, there was no place more obvious than BGF Bank. "Searching for internship places, I was interested in BGF because I had always liked working there before. Also, I was aware of the bank's need for digital solutions. I wanted to apply what I had learned and develop innovations that would help my former employer."

For a duration of two months in late 2021, Armel found himself to be working for BGF once again. Though this time he was well-equipped with digital skills. "I agreed with management to bring IT solutions to the bank. When I applied, I had in mind to design a cue management system to help clients." As it showed, Armel was more than flexible to adjust to the bank's needs as his supervisor asked him to work at the credit department since there was an urgent need for a system that would enhance loan request processes.

Right away, Armel agreed to develop an IT system that manages loan requests. Now, due to the app he designed, there is no more need for customers to come to the bank for application. They can apply for the loan online including uploading all necessary documents. Once the loan is granted, the customer will be contacted to come to the bank. Today, Armel is still finalising the first prototype as it will need to be linked to the security system of the bank. He stresses that he is not done yet, "After I finish my studies, I want to go back to BGF and get approval from BGF management so that my app can be added to the Appstore and customers can download it".

Olivier Kaboko, Director of Information Systems at BGF, shows his appreciation for Armel's work, "Armel brought a new manner to confront problems and resolve them with technological means to BGF. The work he did during his internship will help BGF to serve our customers even more quickly and efficiently when they ask for loans. This will help us to receive new customers".

The benefits of introducing Armel's system are apparent. Firstly, the process becomes easier for the bank if all is done virtually, thereby speeding things up. Secondly, customers can save time and money as they do not need to travel from rural areas to Bujumbura to apply. Thirdly, physical contacts are reduced – another plus in times of COVID-19.

Adding to the loan request system, Armel already has more ideas. "I will go to BGF after finishing my dissertation to see how my mobile system is implemented. Due to my studies, I have a good chance of being hired again. Then, I could also develop and implement an e-office system. This would allow bank management to see digitally who is working on a request in the bank. If there is a delay, you can see where the process is and who is delaying."

Looking back at his studies, Armel highlights, "CENIT@EA helped me to open my eyes on innovation. I know how to tackle challenges now, and I have the basics to work on solving them. I needed this." He also points out that studying in a multicultural environment was a great experience. "I have connections all over East Africa now. I have brothers and sisters from all EAC Partner States and can exchange with them on how to solve problems."

Asked about regional integration, he acknowledges, "Being together is a strength. There is much advantage in coming together and exchanging knowledge. Being able to travel the region freely without visa restrictions is a huge advantage. The exchange of goods, services, and people will better the lives of all East Africans. A team of six can do more than one".

Going forward, Armel wants to contribute to the development of East Africa. "I want to give something in return for the opportunity that I received at CENIT@EA." Indeed, he already found a great way to start.

EAC and GIZ Launch Joint Project on Easing The Movement of Engineers in the EAC Region



The East African Community and the German Federal Ministry for Economic Cooperation and Development (BMZ), after signing the respective Government and Implementation Agreements, jointly launched the new project Digitalisation for East African Trade and Integration (DIGEAT) with an official ceremony at the EAC Secretariat.

The German Government committed EUR 3,000,000 through the initiative Digital Africa, which harnesses digital applications to achieve development goals.

The EAC Secretariat and its implementation partner Deutsche Gesellschaft für Internationale Zusammenarbeit (GIZ) jointly developed the concept for the new project over the past year. DIGEAT aims to simplify the cross-border movement of engineers to render their services in all EAC Partner States. To achieve this objective, the project will improve the relevant regulatory framework and the necessary digital services and tools.

DIGEAT aims to advance on EAC achievements and the cooperation of the EAC Secretariat and GIZ in the Support to East African Market-Driven and People-Centred Integration (SEAMPEC) Project, which has supported the free movement of professionals and provided support to the implementation of the respective Mutual Recognition Agreements for professions such as engineers.

DIGEAT will build on these results with a focus on utilising the benefits of digitalisation and digital applications. To this end, it will work closely with SEAMPEC's follow-on project, which will start in August 2022 with an overall commission value of EUR 15.3million. SEAMPEC II will contribute to increased intra-regional and continental trade for the benefit of East Africans.

Speaking at the launch, EAC Secretary General Hon. Dr Peter Mathuki lauded GIZ for championing digital programmes to create job opportunities for youths in the region.

"The DIGEAT Project is timely as it finds when the EAC is pushing for all Partner States to leverage on new technologies to support the migration of production and service delivery to digital platforms and enhance e-business opportunities across the region," he said.

In his remarks, GIZ Country Director Dr Mike Falke highlighted that increased trade in services and the seamless cross-border movement of professionals is a significant step to deepen economic integration in the EAC.

'In order for this to succeed, the implementation of the existing, and potentially agreement on new, Mutual Recognition Agreements needs to be advanced. With its innovative and consultative approach and utilization of digital tools DIGEAT may offer an efficient and replicable solution, that creates efficiency and ease where currently complex administrative and bureaucratic processes hinder the moving of engineers,' said Dr Falke.

DIGEAT's implementation by the EAC Secretariat will be supported in collaboration with GIZ as part of the long-standing development cooperation between the EAC and Germany. It falls under the cooperation area of Socially and Environmentally Sound Supply Chains, Trade and Sustainable Infrastructure.

East African Community Steps Up Readiness for Health Emergency Response



The East African Community Secretariat today held the first simulation exercise (SIMEX) since the onset of COVID-19 pandemic in order to strengthen preparedness and bolster response to future public health emergencies in the Partner States. The exercise is part of a one-week regional training workshop to strengthen national capacities for exercise operations at ports of entry and is a follow up on Table Top exercise conducted in Arusha in 2018 and the cross-border field simulation exercise at the Namanga border between Kenya and Tanzania in June 2019.

The simulation exercise taking place at Kilimanjaro International Airport in the United Republic of Tanzania is intended to test the knowledge and skills acquired by the participants during the training workshop. The aim of the exercise is to link early warning with preparedness and response. The logistics drill includes a realistic disaster scenario which will help the participants to build skills for design and implementation of simulation exercises at national level.

Kilimanjaro International Airport Security Manager, Justine Makomondi Kisusi, confirmed that the exercise is necessary for strengthening readiness to respond to public health emergencies: "We are delighted to receive all delegates for this emergency simulation exercise, as it will help us combat future outbreaks".

In addition to the COVID-19 pandemic, in recent years, the East African Community (EAC) has experienced numerous outbreaks of infectious diseases and other events of public health concern, such as droughts and floods. In the African Region, about 100 public health events are reported annually. In the last three years, East Africa has had several disease outbreaks such as yellow fever, cholera, Rift Valley fever, Marburg virus disease, measles and Ebola. The region is also prone to natural disasters such floods, landslides and drought. The outbreak of COVID-19 pandemic reinforced the need to enhance public health emergency capacities at ports of entry.

To better prepare for public health emergencies, the EAC Secretariat, with support of WHO and the Deutsche Gesellschaft für Internationale Zusammenarbeit (GIZ) GmbH, conducted a training of 60 emergency response experts and officials from Burundi, Kenya, South Sudan, Tanzania and Uganda on management of public health emergencies at ports of entry. The participants were selected from various One Health sectors including health, environment, agriculture and animal heath, trade, tourism and defence.

Speaking during the opening ceremony, Dr David Balikowa from the East African Community noted that it is critical to keep "assessing and improving the regional health crisis response capacity and status of implementation of the International Health Regulations". Dr Mary Stephen, the WHO Regional Office for Africa Focal Point for International Health Regulations reminded participants of the increasing occurrence of emerging and re-emerging diseases which present immense challenges to detect and contain. The Manager of the EAC/GIZ Support to Pandemic Preparedness in the EAC Region project in Arusha, Tanzania, Dr Irene Lukassowitz, agrees on the need to be prepared for future outbreaks, as "fighting for more resilient health systems can also help withstanding the shock if disaster and potential damage from emergencies".

Project for Strengthening Integrated Water Resource Management Launched at LVBC in Kisumu



With support from the Federal Government of Germany, the Lake Victoria Basin Commission (LVBC) and the East African Community Secretariat officially launched the Integrated Water Resources Management (TC-IWRM) project to be implemented by GIZ in Kisumu, Kenya on 6 July 2022.

The TC-IWRM project aims at achieving strengthened capacities of LVBC and EAC Secretariat institutions in Integrated Water Resources Management as a pathway towards sustainable development in the Lake Victoria Basin Region covering parts of 5 EAC Partner States.

According to the LVBC Executive Secretary, Dr. Bwire K. Masinde, expected results of the projects are harmonized policies, strategies and guidelines to further improve lake level management, water quality improvement and Lake Victoria Catchment management as part of the LVBC's mandate. He therefore applauded the support from the Federal German Government as "additional expression of deepening partnership and friendship between LVBC/EAC and the Federal Government of Germany."

In his statement, Dr. Bwire underscored the linkages between the GIZ project and LVBC's vision which seeks to "ensure people living within the Basin live in a healthy and sustainably managed environment opportunities and benefits."

The launched project will also contribute towards enhancing the resource mobilization role of LVBC and contribute to sustainability of the existing development initiatives such as High Priority Investments (HIPs) yet to be implemented in 5 EAC Partner States. HPIs are funded by Federal Government of Germany through KfW and in cooperation with the European Union.

The German Head of Delegation, Ms Claudia Imwolde-Kraemer, Deputy Head of the Division for East Africa, Federal Ministry for Economic Cooperation and Development, emphasized the important role the LVBC plays in the EAC-German cooperation: "The sustainable management of natural resources and combating the effects of climate change are important elements in German cooperation. We therefore decided to substantially increase our support to the work of the Lake Victoria Basin Commission in this regard and are looking forward to a continuation of our excellent cooperation under the commission's new management."

The IWRM project is financed at a tune of EUR 3.3 million and is an additional contribution to the LVBC's sustainable development agenda. Project beneficiaries include EAC Secretariat, LVBC, EAC Partner States, institutions within EAC Partner States responsible for water resources management, representatives of civil society and the private sector. The project will also contribute towards promotion of sustainable economic use and environmental protection of the EAC's water resources with specific focus on regional frameworks and promotion of effective Integrated Water Resources Management.

EAC and GIZ Embark on Capacity Building Programme on AfCFTA



In order to successfully implement the African Continental Free Trade Area (AfCFTA), it is important that a critical mass be capacitated on various aspects of the AfCFTA and create awareness amongst stakeholders to ensure that all stakeholders are made aware of what to expect and how the AfCFTA will impact on them and the sectors they are involved in.

In readiness to implement the AfCFTA, the EAC with the support of GIZ has embarked on capacity building program commencing with training of trainers sessions including on the AfCFTA Rules of Origin. As customs officers are central to the roll-out and actual application of the AfCFTA instruments, an in-depth understanding of the AfCFTA by customs officials and a high level of awareness by all stakeholders is of great importance.

Accordingly, the EAC Secretariat in collaboration with GIZ has conducted two training sessions for customs officers so far. One in Kigali, Rwanda, 26 to 30 September 2022 and in Mombasa, Kenya, 24 to 28 October 2022.

"GIZ is a true partner, for EACS to ensure that all partner states are on the same page in terms of its integration process, it needs a lot of resources -technical and financial and GIZ is one of the partners who supports the EAC integration process, including capacity building and sensitization on the AfCFTA." Steven Analo thanked GIZ for its continued support to EAC in a quote from his closing remarks today.

It aims at creating a single African market by deepening the economic integration of the continent. 

Open Borders and Border Security can go Hand in Hand.



Open borders, although essential for regional integration, are still widely perceived as a threat to border security. In East Africa, where regional integration is progressing, managing border security while urging for free movement of persons and goods can pose a challenge. A central solution approach that is already adopted is the concept of One Stop Border Posts (OSBPs). The GIZ Support to the African Union Border Programme (GIZ-AUBP) cooperates with the EAC in operationalising these OSBPs via capacity development.

OSBPs can be defined as a single building at the border where border agencies from two neighbouring countries are present. Ideally, their systems are interconnected so that they can conduct checks jointly on the side of the country of entrance. The OSBP concept is one of the strong embodiments of Coordinated Border Management (CBM). In contrast, before establishing the OSBP concept, each country had their own border crossing points, where border agencies worked in silos, and where people and goods were subject to two checks – one at the country of exit, one at the country of entry – by both respective national authorities who mostly did not share information among each other. Implementing the concept of OSBPs brought a noticeable difference for both border agencies and users of the crossing points.

Within the cooperation between GIZ-AUBP and the EAC Secretariat one regional training tool on operationalising OSBPs and coordinated border management was developed and border officers trained about the essence and goal of the OSBPs. This fostered the capacities of operating officers with a harmonised knowledge – given that they come from different agencies, different countries, yet bound to work together. For Director General Customs and Trade of the EAC, Kenneth Bgamuhunda, the benefits are obvious, "It is through such common training and capacity building instruments that EAC guarantees that officials and stakeholders within the EAC are equitably equipped to fully participate in the regional integration agenda." In addition, the initiative improved operation procedures of administrations from neighbouring countries, thereby also advancing regional integration within the EAC.

Following a 'Training of Trainers', over 350 officers from immigration, customs, border police, intelligence, port health, plant and veterinary, revenue authorities have been trained at twelve OSBPs throughout all six EAC Partner States within a two-year period. With the operationalisation of the OSBPs and the joint training "we discover each other, we discover our complementarity, we discover our common challenges and shared responsibility to ensure the security of our countries borders while fostering regional integration", stressed Daniel Kalimuzo, Customs Officer at the Gatuna-Katuna OSBP after taking part in the exercises.

All this is having an impact at several levels. Firstly, the coordination of border officers and agencies has led to a more efficient identification of cross-border criminal activities. Secondly, it has reduced the number of arrests of citizens by officers form either side of the border, which used to create tensions between administrations from neighbouring countries. Thirdly, the coordination and one-check process resulted in swifter border crossings reportedly reducing waiting time for people and goods by approximately 45%, which is a tremendous economic and social gain. This goes to show – open borders and border security can go hand in hand.



Support to the Prevention and Control of Transboundary Animal and Zoonotic Diseases in the EAC Region



The EAC region experiences a high prevalence of transboundary animal diseases (TADs) such as food and mouth disease as well as zoonotic diseases which are transmissible to humans such as Rabies. These diseases are not only a major constraint to livestock production but also represent a threat to animal health, public health as well as food and nutrition security. Furthermore, they have an adverse impact on trade and tourism.

Transmission of TADs and zoonotic disease does not stop at national borders. Hence, strong cooperation of EAC Partner States to implement well-coordinated animal disease prevention and control programmes are urgently needed. These programmes are to follow a One Health approach. The EAC Secretariat plays an important role of coordination the planning and implementation of joint cross-border animal disease prevention and control activities.

The 'One Health' approach considers interdependencies and interactions between all sectors and disciplines which are affected by an outbreak of an infectious disease or other event of public health concern, which can contribute to preventing and to mitigating it. Sectors involved include, but are not limited to human and animal health, environment and climate, agriculture and wildlife, trade and tourism and defense, communities and the media.

The Republic of Uganda and the United Republic of Tanzania are neighboring countries in the EAC with a history of animal disease outbreaks due to cross-border movement of livestock. Therefore, both EAC Partner States agreed to develop and sign a bilateral Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) on Cooperation and Implementation of Cross-Border Measures to Prevent and Control TADs and Zoonoses.

Commissioned by the German Federal Ministry for Economic Cooperation and Development (BMZ), the GIZ Global Programme on Pandemic Prevention and Response, One Health (GP PPOH) supports strengthening the One Health approach in the EAC region to the prevention and control of TADs and zoonoses. Thereby, it contributes to the overall efforts to implement the EAC One Health Strategy, 2022-2027.

In two technical meetings organized by the EAC Secretariat and facilitated by GP PPOH between August and December 2022, experts and political representatives in the area of animal and wildlife health as well as zoonoses from Uganda and Tanzania came together to develop and finalize a bilateral MoU.

The MoU aims at enhancing bilateral cooperation and coordination in the planning, implementation and monitoring of strategies to prevent, control, manage, eliminate, and eradicate TADs and zoonoses along the common border and other mutually agreed actions for at least five years. Final political approval of the bilateral MoU is expected in early 2023 by the Ministers of Foreign Affairs.

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
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
